Resistance & Recovery: Tobacco, Trade & Commerce

Tobacco is a gift from the Creator that holds great importance for First Nation Peoples. Tobacco has always played a significant role in our spiritualities and cultures, connecting us to Creation and to the essence of who we are as Peoples. A theme that runs through many Traditional Teachings is that tobacco is the first plant that the Creator gave to Indigenous Peoples a very long time ago. Each Nation has a story about how tobacco came to them and their own knowledge and relationship with it.

As a traded commodity, tobacco has been significant to Indigenous Nations for millennium. It played a vital role in the creation and maintenance of political, economic, and trade alliances amongst Indigenous Nations for thousands of years prior to European contact. It also became an important commodity in the trading relationship between Indigenous Nations and Europeans. It was not until after Columbus's arrival to the Americas in 1492 that tobacco was brought to lands beyond Turtle Island, sparking the demand that turned tobacco into a global commercialized trading commodity.

Despite centuries of discriminatory policies and the calculated undermining of Indigenous tobacco trade by European colonial governments, the spiritual and cultural importance of tobacco to Indigenous Communities has never changed. Confirmed by the Association of Iroquois and Allied Indians in a 2018 economic study, the economic role of tobacco in member Nation communities also remains significant.

Tobacco businesses are an important source of employment and generate revenue in their communities. They also boost the local economy by helping to bring traffic to other business, such as general retail, restaurants, arts, and culture.

First Nation Peoples have never surrendered jurisdiction over tobacco. We have a relationship with tobacco and a responsibility to maintain balance with all of Creation. We have authority to grow, manufacture, and trade tobacco through our own jurisdictions. We have a collective right to be immune from the taxation policies of foreign governments. We have international Treaties with one another that pre-date contact. And we have international treaties with European Nations.

We know that as Peoples, Communities, and Nations, we have the foundations to grow and to thrive. If we look to our cultural foundations, and work together, we can find ways to help our businesses and Communities mutually support one another. We can create stronger futures for our all of our Peoples.

Indigenous children's Author Kristi White helps to inspire and teach the next generation



Children's author Kristi White of the popular 'The Adventures of Jay and Gizmo' series hails from the Oneida Nation of the Thames. Her four self-published books help to teach Indigenous Children through the antics of a young Indigenous Boy named Jay and a cat named Gizmo. The couple begin their friendship in 'Jay and Gizmo Become Best Friends' and follows them as they learn about the importance of indigenous cultural practices like hair braiding and hoop dancing.

Her books help children to identify and relate with the same thoughts and feelings that Jay goes through thereby helping them to know they don't have to be shy and that it's ok to learn and ask questions.

"All of these things are not things that children are exposed to regularly," she said. "For little Indigenous girls, I'm an Indigenous woman who grew up on a reserve and is doing this." - Kristi White

In an article by CBC Kristi has mentioned that she is workingon translating the books into Ojibway and Oneida languages. No doubt this will go a long way into helping to inspire and motivate indigenous children into taking up the writer's pen themselves. This can be a vital connection especially when they see a book that contains their own language addressing their own culture. It can be hard to relate to characters that are non-indigenous or ones that do not touch upon aspects of their lives they are more familiar with. It's important that more youth can find a role model in authors, artists and figures like Kristi White.





Historically, with First Nations, children were cared for by everyone. The extended family was like a second skin that everyone wore and all were grateful for the added security, nurturing and bonding that the extended family brought to the children of the Nation. The extended family brought strength and unity to the families and the Nation.

Inherent jurisdiction is not just about land rights, it is the sovereign right for First Nations to continue to determine what is right for our Peoples and how we go about implementing those determinations. The umbrella potentially shielding children and families of First Nations is our inherent jurisdiction. The strength of our child wellbeing jurisdiction depends on our citizens and their willingness to take on responsibilities of the extended family.

If you care about children and their well-being, perhaps you would be interested in opening your heart and your home to a child in need of security and a safe place to grow. Caldwell First Nation is seeking individuals willing to take on the responsibility of caring for a child or children temporarily in their home. Homes are required for short term, long term, respite (generally weekends) and potentially for adoption as well.
